

## California Proposition 65 (CP65)

California's Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 prohibits, among other things, contractors from knowingly and intentionally exposing individuals to substances known to the State of California to be carcinogenic or toxic to reproduction without warning of the potential hazards.

The current CP65 list of substances includes around 900 substances and warnings for the individual substances. These include warnings such as carcinogenic, harmful for reproduction, influences on development and gender-specific warnings for men and/or women

Wiesemann & Theis GmbH is currently only aware of one substance for which exposure is even conceivable:

Lead and lead compounds  
CAS: 7439-92-1

Carcinogenic  
Harmful for development  
Harmful for men and women

Exposure to the specified substances is conceivable through contact with connectors on the device. Further exposure, e.g. through contact with other components on printed circuit boards, is currently neither apparent nor likely if our devices are used as intended.

However, our devices, and in particular the connectors we use, are RoHS-compliant and, due to the exemption regulation there, only a very small amount of lead can be contained in the alloys.

What's more, our devices are not always in your hands. They are unpacked, installed and then do their job, e.g. in a control cabinet.

Exposure that exceeds the relevant limits is therefore difficult to imagine when handling our devices, either through contact via the skin or orally, whereby in the latter case a lack of hand hygiene would also have to be taken into account. With a clear conscience, we therefore refrain from issuing a corresponding warning.

We will continue to monitor the issue and update this document as necessary.
